


National Severe Weather Warning Service



Chief Forecasters Assessment

An increasingly cold northwesterly flow will become established across Northern Ireland. A mix of sleet and snow showers followed by clear spells, will lead to a significant risk of ice, particularly on untreated surfaces. In addition, one or two centimetres of snow could fall almost anywhere, with locally more than 5 cm for higher ground in the north, particularly above 200 metres elevation.

The Met Office have issued a **Yellow Warning of Ice**

Valid from **18:00 on Sun, 04th Dec 2011** until **12:00 on Mon, 05th Dec 2011**

Showers will turn increasingly wintry through Sunday and into Monday morning, with icy stretches likely to affect many parts of Northern Ireland at times. In addition, snow accumulations are expected in places, particularly for higher ground towards the north.

The public should be aware that the wintry conditions could cause travel disruption in places.
