SOIL MOISTURE DEFICIT AT 0900 GMT ON 23 APRIL 1975


Cold weather prevailed from the issue of the last bulletin [3 April 1975] to the 10th with snow falls occurring generally except on the 6th and 10th when falls were restricted to a few areas mainly in Scotland. For the remaining period until the 21st, Great Britain was generally wet except on the 12th and 19th when rainfall was restricted mainly to Scotland [including Northern England on the 19th]. Heavy rain and thunderstorms were reported on the 18th. The 22nd was generally dry over most of Great Britain. Rainfall values indicate that general rainfall, over England and Wales, has already exceeded the average for the month by 11% and has reached the average for April over Scotland.

The larger deficits, indicated in the last issue, in the Lothians and Ayresshire continued to develop as a result of the fairly dry cold weather in the early days of the month. Similar sized deficits [> 10 mm] also developed in the Central Scottish Lowlands, Southern Scotland and Central Lancashire. During this period the largest deficits amounting to 19 mm were found in Dumfries. The change to generally wet weather reduced deficits over the United Kingdom to an insignificant level, but field capacity exists in Kirkcudbright. Deficits are, however, increasing slightly in the Midlands, East Anglia, Southern and South-East England. The largest deficits, amounting to 10 mm, are to be found in North Kent but these can still be regarded as insignificant.




ESTIMATED SOIL MOISTURE DEFICIT (S.M.D.)
AT 09 GMT ON 23 APR 1975


